John Fitch made the first successful trial of a 45-foot steamboat on the Delaware River.



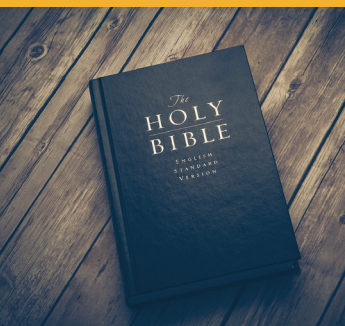
COVERED BRIDGE 1805

Westinghouse hired Dr. Frank Conrad to begin regular transmission from station KDKA in Pittsburgh.



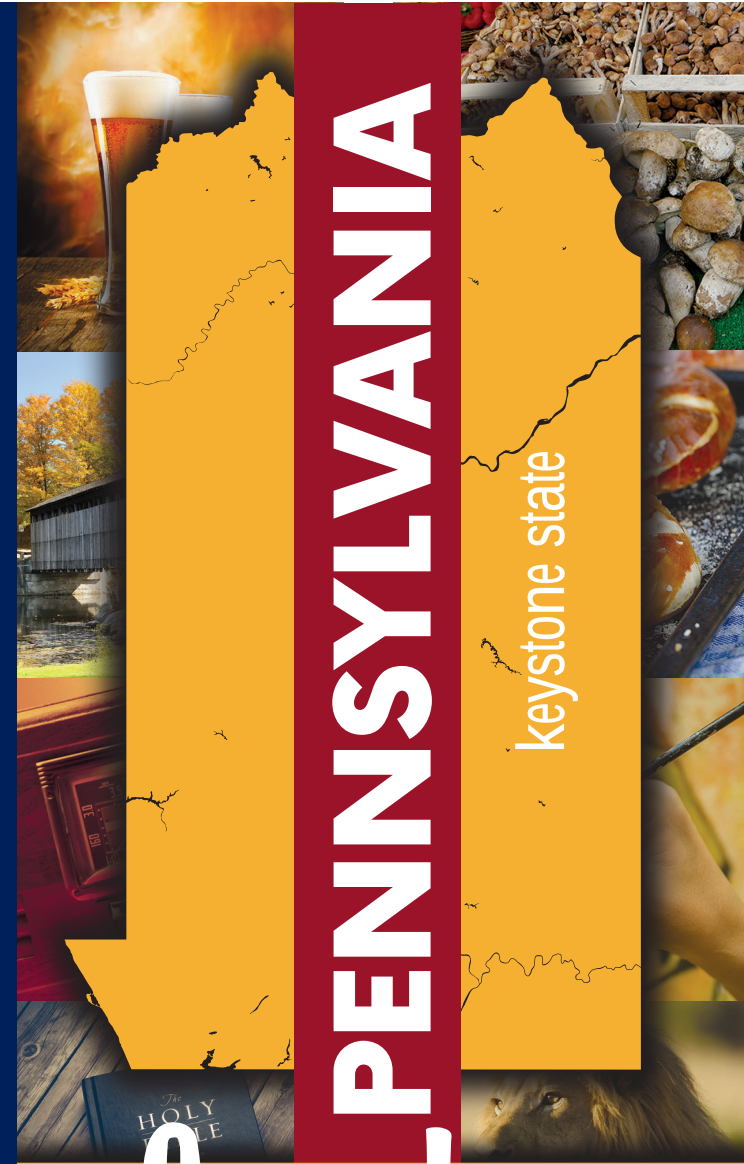
BIBLE TRANSLATED INTO ENGLISH 1782

The University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia.



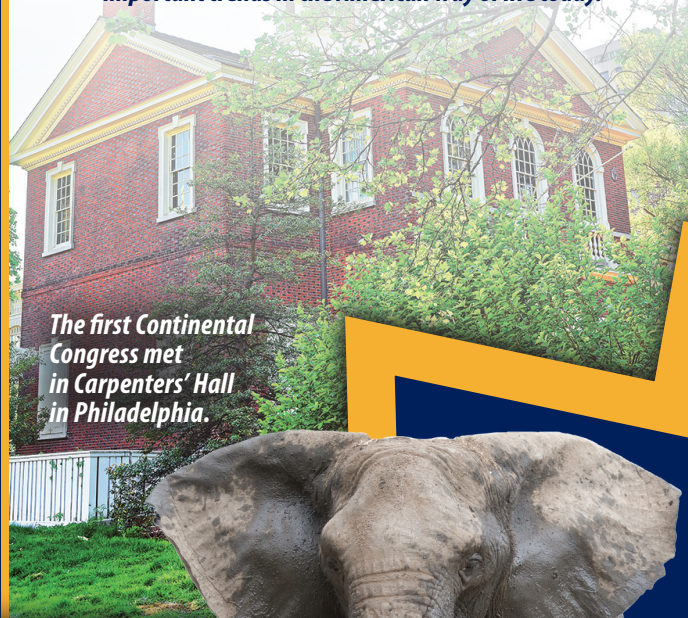
SUBSCRIPTION LIBRARY 1731

EST. 1774

In addition to being the nation's first capital, Pennsylvania was the first state in the nation to set many of the important trends in the American way of life today.

MUSHROOM MANUFACTURER 1982

The Swayne Brothers grew mushrooms in cave outside Philadelphia.



FIRST COMMERCIALY SOLD ROOT BEER 1876

Pharmacist Charles Elmer Hires developed his root tea from sassafras and debuted a commercial version he called "Root Beer" at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition.



PRETZEL MANUFACTURER 1861

Sturgis Pretzel House in Lititz.



SCRAPPLE MANUFACTURER 1863

Habersett Pork Products in Middletown Township, Delaware County founded by Joshua Habersett.

ART SCHOOL 1805

The Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, Philadelphia.

ZOO 1874

The Philadelphia Zoo was chartered by the Commonwealth on March 21, 1859, but its opening was delayed by the American Civil War until July 1, 1874.

LAGER BEER 1829

Invented by David Yuengling in Pottsville.

Opened by Volney B. Palmer in Philadelphia.

BIRD OF PREY SANCTUARY 1934

Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, Kempton, East Brunswick Township. Rosalie Edge leased 1,400 acres of property on Hawk Mountain and hired wardens, Maurice Broun and wife Irma.

The Allegheny Athletic Association played against the Pittsburgh Athletic Club.



U.S. MINT 1792

The first coins were designed by David Rittenhouse in Philadelphia.

PAPER MILL 1690

Opened by William Bradford and William Rittenhouse in Germantown, Philadelphia.

Nickelodeon in Pittsburgh.
